New Faculty Spotlight

Christine Choi, PhD

Assistant Professor, English



Q: Tell us a bit about yourself.

A: I'm the youngest of four girls, and the only one to pursue a degree in the humanities. I earned my Ph.D. from the Graduate Center, CUNY, where my research focused on Victorian Literature and Women's Studies. My dissertation was on Victorian sensation fiction,

focusing on how humor works unobtrusively with the uncanny and the violent in these texts, thus revealing the authors' cultural, historical, and political critiques.

Q: What most excites you about your new position at Hostos?

A: I am honored to be joining such an accomplished yet humble group of scholars within the Hostos English department. [...] I'm also excited to have been able to revamp my syllabi and assignments for the new courses I've been assigned to teach. So far, my students have responded well and risen to the challenge of analyzing and critiquing some difficult texts.

Q: What are your current research projects?

A: I'm working on a project focused on 19th century texts that interrogate constructs of Victorian womanhood and maternity. I'm interested in both sympathetic and critical portrayals of women on whom the maternal ideal is forced, and what, if any, models are offered for being a "good" woman.

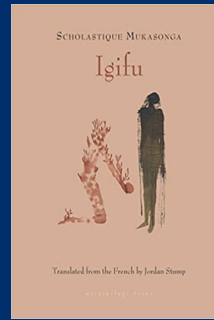
Q: What most excites you about your new position at Hostos?

Former English Chair Andrea Fabrizio Becomes Associate Dean of Academic Affairs

We asked Prof. Fabrizio to discuss her exciting transition to this new position.



I am excited to have this opportunity to share the work I am doing in my new role as OAA Associate Dean with the English Department.

These past few months

working with our Provost, Dr. Shiang-Kwei Wang, and the OAA team, have been an incredible and enjoyable learning experience. I am happy to be working with a number of initiatives and programs, some familiar and some very new, and to learn more about the many ways our faculty and staff work to support our students. I work closely to support five academic departments including Behavioral and Social Sciences, Language and Cognition, Math, the Library and English. I am delighted to be able to work with the English Department and to continue to work with WAC and the Writing Center. It is also a pleasure to collaborate with the many directors and offices that support our students, including HALC, START, CLIP, ASAP, USIP, First Year Experience, and the Honors program. My new role also gives me the opportunity to support faculty and student research on campus by working with CSTEP/STEP, CRSP, and the Grants Office. One project I am particularly excited about this term is co-chairing a subcommittee of the Cross Divisional Advisement Committee on Advisement with Director of the Coaching Unit, Jason Pelosi. We will be working to define what we mean by advising on campus and on how to form a true partnership between advisors/coaches and faculty in supporting our students. This position offers new experiences and new challenges, and because of the many rewarding years I had the privilege to spend with the English Department, I feel well-prepared and optimistic about the year ahead. Fellowship Leave Catchup with Prof. Anne Rounds

I enjoyed a productive sabbatical in 2021 – 2022. By the end, I had finished writing a longform elegy entitled *Clearing the Stage*, and published it on Manifold, CUNY’s open-source platform for digital publishing. The work is a suite of poems responding to the pandemic and its shifting aftermath. Working with our own Kryisia Michael, I learned how to manipulate my manuscript so the poems displayed with all the proper spacing and line breaks. There are a lot of allusions to other texts, and Manifold allows hyperlinking and hosting of supplemental materials, so readers know where I am stealing my material. *Clearing the Stage* is now live [here!](#)

I also completed a scholarly article, “Crippling Core Books: Beyond Accessibility in the Great Books Classroom.” The article will appear in a special issue of the *College English Association Critic* themed on “Impediments to Student Success.” Using critical lenses from disability studies, I unpack the terminology of access within select Great Books initiatives, community college missions, and their paratexts. Writing this article was a way to reflect on aspects of Hostos’ Columbia Core program and place it in a larger context, and I also enjoyed integrating lived experience into a piece of academic writing.

Other artistic opportunities cropped up during the year. In March, I prepared and performed a Franz Schubert solo piano work, *Klavierstück D. 946 No.1 in E-flat minor*, at New York City’s Merkin Hall. The performance was part of the Kaufman Music Center’s Day of Musical Action, a fundraiser for music education. Playing on the Merkin stage, a space known for its superb acoustics and innovative programming, was a mix of scary and amazing, and I was so happy to share the performance on Zoom with many members of the department. I am including a picture from the event—perhaps a more compelling visual than a picture of me typing an article on my laptop.

Fellowship Leave Catchup with Prof. Tram Nguyen

My fellowship leave was a productive time. My article “Feminist Memorializations in Piercy and Carter” was completed and published in an issue of *Gender Forum* titled “Gender, Violence, and the State in Contemporary Speculative Fiction.” I’m proud to acknowledge that this essay came out of a writing-intensive Special Topics electives course for the English department called “Feminist Cyberpunk Narratives.”

I presented at two conferences: an hour-long talk at the 2021 International Writing Center Association Conference on the successful practices of the Hostos Writing Center, titled, “The Bronx Way: Re-thinking Educational Access and Social Justice” and at the Modernist Memories Conference at Goethe University Frankfurt in May 2022. My paper “The Neural Time Scales of Stein’s *Geography and Plays*” read Stein’s writing through the lens of contemporary neuroscientific discoveries about time-mapping and memory encoding.

I was invited to participate in a NEH Summer Institute at the Newberry Library titled “Making Modernism.” Capped at 25 attendees, this three-week institute allowed me to make use of the Newberry archives and receive feedback from colleagues on a draft of the theatrical staging of Gertrude Stein’s children’s fable, *The World Is Round*, which I hope to submit to the *Feminist Modernist Studies* journal in Fall 2022.

This term, Prof. Nguyen also resumes her position as director of the Hostos Writing Center.
